School Safety

I want to again extend my gratitude for all of your continued support in keeping our students safe. I know that this month has presented some challenging and emotional times for us all, and I want you to know that as a system, there is nothing we place more care and concern for, than the safety of our children.

Stober and all Jeffco Public Schools are deeply committed to keeping students and staff safe:

 We take proactive measures to build community and create a safe environment, setting expectations of respect and inclusion, providing mental health supports, reaching out to families when students display a need for intervention, defining clearly how we expect students to behave while in school, and addressing inappropriate behavior promptly.

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Message from the Principal, continued...

- **Preparation for emergencies** includes detailed school and district plans for a variety of crisis situations, staff training, and regular emergency drills that include students.
- Safety measures consist of controlled entrances, visitor check-ins, video cameras, security staff support, School Resource Officers (SROs) assigned by our local law enforcement agencies, and more.

• The school district, with input from local law enforcement and other experts, continuously examines aspects of school security and how we might enhance our already robust policies and practices.

2019-2020 Staff Professional Learning Days

I wanted to make everyone aware that for next year, the entire district has moved to full release days for 2019-20 for staff professional learning. The Wheat Ridge articulation engaged in full release days this year, but next year this change will be district wide. In addition, there have been discussions at the district level regarding a weekly late start to provide additional planning and development time for staff. While the district supports the need for this time, there will not be a change for the 2019-20 school adding a late start for schools.


Jeffco Public Library Summer Reading Challenge

Dear Stober Families,

Happy April! Sam and Liz here! This month we are going to talk about kindness and being nice. Did you know that there is a difference between the words nice and kind? According to the dictionary, being "nice" is when you are polite and treat people well and being "kind" is when you care about people and show you care. Sometimes you can be kind to someone even though you are not nice to them and you can be nice to someone but also be unkind.

We have been doing a lot of work and education this year with students around kindness and being nice. During Stober's after school Kindness Club, students are engaged in projects to teach students how to be kind as well as how to spread acts of kindness to others. So far this year, club members have made Valentine's Day cards for teachers and staff, painted nice messages on rocks for a Kindness Message Rock Garden, and participated in a Chalk Message Project. Students used chalk to write nice messages on the blacktop to inspire others to be nice and kind to themselves, as well as others.

As you may know, we have partnered with the organization Just Be Nice, whose mission is to spread the word, the meaning, and the act of being nice all over the community. The "Just Be Nice" organization came to our school to facilitate an all-school assembly. Students created an art project to show what being nice means and looks like for them. These projects are displayed in the hallway between the gymnasium and workroom. During the assembly you could hear the students shout, "just be nice" from across the building. This enthusiasm has transferred easily into the following school days where students were heard encouraging one another to be nice.

Classrooms elected Nice Ambassadors to help encourage this message of kindness throughout the rest of the school year. These students have taken on the responsibility of demonstrating what it looks like to be nice, participating in "Just Be Nice" lunches and events, and reminding their classmates to contribute to the "Just Be Nice" Classroom Journal in order to create a positive and nice culture and climate.

Our Nice Ambassador's participated in the Seeds of Kindness Challenge sponsored by the "Drake Durkee Foundation".

Here is a little about them;



Drake Durkee was a compassionate and kind kid who was born and raised in Golden, CO and attended elementary school at Maple Grove Elementary. Drake excelled at life. He was a son, a brother to three, a student, a leader, an athlete, a friend, a football fan and a boy of faith. His spirited personality and work ethic inspired everyone around him. He had courage, strength and leadership abilities beyond his years. It was natural for him to show compassion and kindness; he knew no other way. The life of Drake Durkee tragically ended on June 10, 2015, at age 11, during a whitewater rafting tour in Buena Vista, CO. As a way to celebrate Drake's life, Drake's family began a foundation in his honor that empowers children to connect through kindness and compassion.

Since its establishment in 2015, the Drake Durkee Foundation has been working with the nearby community to raise funds and spread kindness by supporting local charities, scholarships, and individuals. Last year the Drake Durkee Foundation began the Seeds of Kindness Challenge for students at Maple Grove Elementary and Manning Middle Schools. This year the foundation hopes to widen the ripple effect and spread kindness into surrounding areas, starting in 2019 with Stober Elementary.

Each Nice Ambassador developed a proposal by answering the question, "If I had \$100, how would I use it to spread kindness?"

Some ideas included:

- Purchasing a bench and painting nice quotes and messages all over it.
- Creating a banner, showing the community our school focus on being nice to ourselves and others.
- Creating gifts to give to the local Nursing Home and Police Station.

Each classroom won the \$100 to carry out their projects!
